
YEAR IN REVIEW 2018

- Mudcrabs continued to take advantage of festival platforms by each semester including a new work in the Comedy Festival or Melbourne Fringe. Their show Mindquest – a Journey into Forever saw them experimenting outside sketch comedy and winning an award for development time and space, which will be put toward their 2019 show Kit Goodman! A Good Man also to be staged in the Comedy Festival.

things we should talk about

A new dance theatre work was presented at UHT in Semester I in the Guild Theatre. Directed by UHT Co-Artistic Director Xanthe Beesley the process also provided students the chance to work with renowned choreographer Michelle Heaven.

Tackling the hard issues one gesture at a time – things we should talk about provided a platform to reintroduce dance to the UHT program and to explore an inventive, intensive devising process. A diverse group of 15 students made up the ensemble of this movement-based work which catalogued all the things that are unsaid in our society and asked what happens when people stay silent? This original piece explored the things we 'should' be talking about but aren't, the conversations we might be having if we weren't plugged in and tuned out and the physical act of turning away from difficult ideas





DANCE ON CAMPUS

A culture of dance and movement has started to brew in 2018 with a broad range of activities, one-off events and programs for students of all interests and abilities. Activities included:

- things we should talk about a new dance theatre production
- Students working with professional choreographers including Michelle Heaven and Holly Durant
- Theatre Board grants to support a dance video project and student participation in professional dance classes
- · Dance performances in *Tastings*

- Choreography workshops

- O-week / Winterfest pop up 80s dance class attended by over 50 students
- Student Theatre Groups like Flare Dance Ensemble, with a focus on dance



IDA ALUMNI EVENT

A hugely popular Alumni event was held during the season. It is a special thing when UHT gets to meaningfully re-engage with its past students (especially after 24 years). We know what we do has a significant impact on individual students, the University community and extra-curricular creative-output across campus – it's great to be reminded of how long-lasting that impact is. The alumni spoke of how their time at UHT had been formative in their friendship circles, world-view and long-term engagement with the arts.

It was fantastic to see the show we made all those years ago reinterpreted and, if anything, made even more relevant today than it was then... thanks for the nostalgia trip you've sent me on these last few days. It's been much more moving and impactful than I expected it to be.

Ida, was presented in second semester in the Guild Theatre directed by Co-Artistic Director Petra Kalive and composed by alumnus Ashlee Clapp and the cast. This musical celebrated the achievements of young women who challenged the institution and became the first women to study at the University of Melbourne.

This production was a reimagining of the 1994 UHT production *The Princess Ida Parlour* written by Anita Punton and directed by then Artistic-Director Rosemary Myers. There were some eerie similarities between the 1994 and 2018 productions; the creative team comprised mostly women, there was a transformation in the cast across rehearsal and production – they grew as an ensemble but also as individuals, there was lots of laughter, lots of learning about the first women at UniMelb, the piece was created and performed by students from across the University studying a range of degrees from Science to Psychology and both Rosemary Meyers and Petra Kalive had 6 month old babies that they fed in the rehearsal room – which they couldn't have done, had those first women not stood up and said "we want in!".

PROGRAM

In 2018 UHT continued its Writer-in-Residence Program with the support of Theatre Board.

The Writer-in-Residence program was an opportunity for 12 emerging writers to work with a professional playwright over 6 months, developing their unique style and voice as writers of new works for stage. Students participated in workshops, one-on-one sessions, and brought their ideas to the stage in the Playwrighting MiniFest, in the Guild Theatre in Semester 2.

The 2018 Writer-in-Residence was playwright, dramaturg and theatre-maker Mari Lourey. Mari's collaborative practice, and political work and industry expertise made her a dynamic choice for the 2018 UHT Writer-in-Residence.

PLAYWRIGHTING MINIFEST

In Semester 2, participants put their work and themselves out there in the Playwrighting MiniFest. Over two nights, snippets of work were heard and seen by full houses spilling over with supportive peers. Many of the works gestated in this program have gone on to have future development opportunities with UHT, Student Theatre Groups, at Fringe Festivals and more.


PRODUCTION

The backbone of all venue and performance activities at UHT is our Production Team. Our Production & Venue Manager, Head Technician and Stage Carpenter lead a team of 18 casual theatre workers and while you may not always spot them, they are at the forefront of foyers, backstage and bio boxes of each student theatre production. They provide workshops, mentorships, production budget and scheduling guidance, production meetings, technical and design advice, bump ins, venue hire, maintenance, and offer a box of tissues and a loud cheer on opening nights.

SET BUILDING WORKSHOP

In 2018 the Production team led an exciting project to upgrade the Set Building Workshop. By removing a wall in the basement of the Union Theatre, a large workshop area was revealed – offering twice as much room to support the growing requirements of student theatre. This has seen an increase in the number of activities and workshops that UHT has been able to offer to students and the broader University community.



ACCESS AND INCLUSION

UHT upholds the highest principles of access and inclusion which are built on the hard work undertaken to date on UHT's Disability Action Plan. Regular consultation with student theatre groups reveals a passionate community keen to deliver best practice models of access and inclusion across student theatre.

In 2018 the student theatre community offered captioned performances, Auslan interpreted shows and nights that were audio described. Provision of relaxed performances are on the increase, with many groups creating break-out spaces and information kits for audience. 'Pay as you feel' performances were also popular.

UHT continued to work with Description Victoria for audio description and trialled captioning through Go Theatrical. Several student works were Auslan interpreted via a range of providers. Wayfinding videos, storyboards, large print and digital programs (all offered to patrons prior to attending performances) provided ways to ensure the whole theatre-going experience was accessible as possible for the community.

UHT auspices Theatre Board Access grants for student theatre groups, to help cover costs. UHT also offers an award for a student or group who has demonstrated best practice access and inclusion in the presentation of their event
