# ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

It is such a privilege to watch students develop into performers and theatre-makers.

When they take their first tentative steps into the UHT office and ask in a small voice how they can be involved in theatre on campus, you cannot help a rush of affection. For you know they have taken the first steps into a unique community on campus, to finding their voice — to a whole world of theatre making they never knew existed.

In 2019 Union House Theatre has continued to reach out to these students, in particular to strengthen pathways and remove barriers, making sure that what we do is accessible to anyone who wants to participate in extracurricular performance on campus. Our 24 hour-play-generator project, held during SummerFest, is one of these long standing initiatives bringing many fresh faces to the Union House stages.

The UHT production, *The Lonely Crowd*, a devised movement-based theatre work with almost all new students, investigated connection in the digital age. This was led by Co-Artistic Director Xanthe Beesley, supported by our Artist-In-Residence, Emma Hall and created with the students.

This year has seen a dedicated focus on the development of new work, led by Co-Artistic Director Petra Kalive, with a season of new plays as part of La Mama's Exploration Season at The Burrow and a season of work presented by students in the Guild Theatre presented within the Melbourne Fringe Festival.

These dedicated programs provided pathways (and the all-important deadline) for students to create work and connect with Industry.

Responsive workshops both in the artistic and technical areas continue to be a staple offering and are well attended. Student Theatre Groups continue to produce varied and exciting work — and big thanks must be given to our production team who shepherded and supported the artistic ambition of almost 40 student-driven events.

2019 is also Petra's final year in the role of Artistic Director/Theatre Coordinator for Union House Theatre — she leaves UHT in the capable hands of Xanthe Beesley. It is with great pride that she leaves a thriving community of theatremakers, comedians, dancers, movers, directors, designers and critics who will without a doubt use their formative experiences at UHT to go onto successful careers in many fields.

Is it lonely in here? Or is that just me....

Ideas for The Lonely Crowd came from many conversations where we wondered how 'we' connect and what it is that keeps 'us' apart?"

What are the real, technological and perceived barriers preventing people from forming community and does our digital world make this harder or easier than before? We became curious as to the impact of these ideas on young people and turned to a group of eleven committed and courageous performers to explore.

The process encouraged experimenting with different methods of theatre devising — both through movement and text — and drew on the ideas of the ensemble each step of the way. What we made was a piece that asked questions and (like a painting in a gallery) it's meaning could be interpreted in many ways.

The Lonely Crowd was a collage of ideas, movements and sound bites which all came from the performers' own experiences of feeling alone and looking for connection.


# UHT/GPG COLLABORATION

# GUILD FRINGE

# LA MAMA EXPLORATIONS

Union House Theatre supported nine students to develop new works for presentation as part of the La Mama Explorations season at The Burrow in June.

These works were first drafts, or unfinished scripts presented to an audience for the first time. Supported by student directors, actors, stage managers these writers developed these plays with professional mentorship. The buzz and excitement generated from these new plays has led to the formation of new theatre companies, staging of new work and further opportunities to present work at La Mama.

This initiative follows Union House Theatre's long -standing tradition of nurturing student playwrights, directors, performers and technicians since 1969. So many of our alumni go onto successful careers in the arts. UHT is proud of the diversity of voices that it empowers and our La Mama Explorations Season was no exception.

## **PRODUCTION REPORT**

The backbone of all venue and performance activities at Union House Theatre is our Production Team.

Our Production and Venue Manager; Khat Kerr, Head Technician; Clynton Jones and Stage Carpenter; Allen Laverty, lead a team of eighteen casual theatre workers.

While you may not always spot them, they are at the forefront of every foyer, back stage and bio box of each student theatre production providing technical, production and management workshops and mentorships, production budget and scheduling guidance, hosting production meetings, providing technical and design advice, running bump ins and outs, providing management, venue hire, maintenance and the occasional shoulder to cry on with a box of tissues and always a rousing, loud cheer on opening nights.

The Production Team has hosted 102 production meetings, received 31 lighting plans and 19 sound designs, set up 11 orchestras, 3 visits from Nigel the Union Theatre's resident possum and used 2.4 kilometres of gaffa tape to hold it all together!

In 2019, the Production Team have covered the myriad of performance genres from dance and movement, musical theatre, cultural events, talent quests, drama and comedy...and some works that will not be defined by category! The Production Team also supported the biennale student run festival Mudfest 2019 and the first annual Guild Fringe Festival that were both incredible experiences.

Highlights for the Production Team include the ensemble site specific work of UHT's presented *The Lonely Crowd* in the George Paton Gallery, the originality of new work *Inkling* by Floor Work, as well as the problem-solving creativity of *Kung-Fu Man* and *Maniac Me* by Chinese Theatre Group.



# ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM

**UHT Artist in Residence statement 2019** 

During my residency at Union House Theatre in February 2019, I co-devised an ensemble performance, mentored productions, led two workshops on contemporary theatre making practice and performance, and had many discussions with students about their heroes, histories and art-making.

In semester one, I worked with Xanthe Beesley to create *The Lonely Crowd*, a devised theatre performance looking at the loneliness faced by students in a big city university. Xanthe and I spent weeks building trust and community with the ensemble of mainly new performers. Together, we researched what loneliness feels like: singularly and collectively, in our bodies and our minds, and online and IRL. We discovered that loneliness exists irrespective of the number of people in your life; what matters is the quality of social connection. I was variously moved, bewildered and inspired by the sheer talent and intelligence of the cast, and their willingness not only to learn theatre-making practice, but to interrogate how these skills and practices can inform and reflect upon their academic studies and personal lives.

During Mudfest and Melbourne Fringe, I advised creatives on three productions: *¡freak out!* by Charlie Zhang and Wilson Liew and *Overripe* by Alice Wheaton (both Mudfest productions), and *The Playground* (Four Letter Word Theatre). I also provided tips and support for various students regarding their career goals, creative challenges and research interests.

Working in a university environment, where ideas and social critique hold such currency, has had a brilliant impact on my artistic practice as a political artist. I've enjoyed the opportunity to interrogate, through debate and active experimentation, contemporary theatre practice and Australian industry trends with these students. I very much hope to continue the relationships I've formed with this younger generation of theatre makers, and look forward to seeing their work continue to evolve into 2020 and beyond.
