Union House Theatre (UHT) is a community of people who, through a shared passion for exploring creativity, come together to make art happen.

UHT is the creative hub for extracurricular student theatre and performance at the University of Melbourne Student Union (UMSU). We provide an environment where diverse and autonomous student theatre can flourish, supporting an ecology of high-impact, student-led creativity. UHT facilitates and supports performance in all its forms by providing artistic leadership, creative programs, technical advice, mentoring, education and networking/industry opportunities that are responsive to students' needs.

We acknowledge that we live, work and create theatre on the lands of the Wurundjeri Woi Wurrung people and pay our respects to their Elders past and present. We extend that respect to all First Nations people, and the long and rich histories of storytelling, art and culture on this land. Sovereignty was never ceded.




New Venue

Student Impact

Participation in programs remained high throughout the year, with strong engagement in workshops, residencies, intensives and mentorships.

Audition interest and cast numbers for UHT's production were significant. The Peer Mentors worked alongside new students to help grow their confidence and led folk through a range of activities all throughout the year. Student Theatre Groups grew membership and connection and new groups formed, whilst existing groups expanded and tried different processes and ideas. The recently developed venues were eagerly used by these groups to perform musicals, new writing, physical theatre and more.

UHT's programming included our long awaited, twice delayed production of *Nora: A Doll's House* by Stef Smith (UHT's final production in the old Union Theatre), as well as a punchy suite of creative and technical skill-building workshops and a Writer in Residence program with its own Play Reading Mini Fest to celebrate student writing. Creative development remained strong. The 2022 UHT Awards Night provided the perfect end to the year and a chance to celebrate the community and their achievements.

UHT Production

NORA: A Doll's House



UHT presented *Nora: A Doll's House* in the old Union Theatre, 26–30 April.

This play takes Ibsen's Nora and situates her in 1918, 1968, and 2018, to chart the progress society has made over 100 years, yet it also acknowledges just how little has changed in the fight for women's rights. This production of *Nora: A Doll's House* marked the final time that UHT used the Union Theatre in Union House — a venue that has served the community so well since 1938.

In a new era for student theatre at UMSU, we then transitioned our activities to the Arts and Cultural building in the Student Precinct at Parkville campus. Performing a political piece, with a nod to history and new questions for the future seemed like a fitting way to end our residence at Union House and move to new stages.

This production reminded us of what UHT has become known for — theatrical experimentation, giving voice to, and encouraging the creative journeys of, students. With this work we engaged a new generation of student artists and invited them into the next act of theatre on campus. An amazing team of professionals came together to support them — directing, designing and managing the environment where the students' performances could flourish.

Writer in Residence Program

In 2022 UHT continued its Writer in Residence Program in collaboration with La Mama Theatre.

The Writer in Residence program was an opportunity for 12 emerging writers to work with professional playwrights over 6 months, developing their unique style and voice as writers of new works for stage. Students participated in workshops, one-on-one sessions, and brought their ideas to the stage in the Playwrighting mini-fest, in the Guild Theatre as part of the Tastings Festival. Over one glorious afternoon writers took that important next step of sharing their words with an audience for the first time. Many of the works incubated in this program will go on to have future development opportunities at La Mama Explorations, with Student Theatre Groups and in UHT's program of activities in 2023.

The two professional mentors were Melissa Reeves and Tasnim Hossain.



2022 was yet another year of new things for UHT's Production Department — not least of all two new venues to figure out!

It was just in time that after successive years of Covidinduced interruptions to student theatre, we finally returned to a full season of shows in the original Union and Guild theatres in Semester 1. We dusted off the cabling, the microphones, the curtains, and our own joints, and helped student theatre groups to shine the lights and turn up the sound for the last time in these iconic venues before moving across to our new forever home in the Arts and Cultural Building.

The new Union and Guild theatres (and the stunning natural-light-filled new Workshop!) greeted us in Semester 2 with new ways of working and plenty to adapt to. Still hot off the press when we bumped in the first ever show in these spaces, there was lots to discover and lots to learn.

From exciting joys (a sound console advanced enough to coordinate a NASA moon landing) to some new challenges (a sound console advanced enough to coordinate a NASA moon landing), with the patience and expertise of our team we helped 15 student productions find their way to the stage and worked hard on everything that will be possible in 2023 and beyond.

In 2022 we were thrilled to be back in person after two ceremonies on Zoom, with the first award ceremony ever held in the new venues. It was a huge success and offered a great platform to acknowledge the burgeoning creativity happening at UHT. Prizes were proudly supported by the University of Melbourne Theatre Board. There were 33 awards providing prizes for professional development/industry opportunities and 'best of' categories.

The Awards Committee is made up of seven students who are representative of the Student Theatre Community. The committee volunteered their time to see all 25 theatre productions as well as meeting four times throughout the year to collate nominations and select the categories and winners. We thank them for their huge commitment to make this awards program a success.

The University of Melbourne has one of the longest histories of student theatre in Australia. In the last 20 years alone, over 150 individual student theatre groups have taken part in presenting a staggering 535 productions. This rich history is documented in the Melbourne University Student Theatre (MUST) online archive, which is bursting at the seams. Wherever you look, you can uncover students finding new and innovative ways to tell the stories on stage that have mattered to them.

In 2022, Union House Theatre worked alongside the University of Melbourne Theatre Board to explore student theatre history on campus. Contracted by the Board, Artist Liv Satchell led the group in an exploration titled "Student Theatre Archive Project" which was also supported by Melbourne Theatre Company, in particular Jeremy Rice – Head of Education and Families.

Semester 2 saw 15 students participating in a six-week workshop series exploring the last 20 years in student theatre on campus, as a springboard for writing their own page in the MUST history book. They developed the tools to generate their own creative ideas and learned how to communicate them to potential collaborators and to the people who can support their work.
