Elected Reps

We had a special elected rep just for the MSEEP Green Paper. We presented chancellery with some broad issues that we have with the paper, and where we think its strengths are. The TLDR is that we believe that the student experience is outside of the classroom and is the totality of a student's time – academic, social, services, and transport. The official response is due on the 30th, we have started it.

Academic Board

Rescheduled AB happened! It was a quite one. Not much to report other than there was discussion on MSEEP and the relationship between students, their social opportunities and the academic environment.

RadEd Week

I'm chairing the student sustainability forum tonight (16/4) for the environment department. Very keen to talk a sustainable, divested campus. Will update in future reports

Respect Work

Met with Celia Scott from chancellery to talk Respect. We received an update on consent matters, our consent module, and the anonymous reporting register that was released this year. We also talked about the future of anonymous reporting at the university, how the VC is interacting with the space, and the weird ground we've found ourselves with respect – in that, that there are still issues that surround the safety of students on campus but most of them are being addressed. In all honesty, this space will be a difficult one to navigate in the next few years because it shifted from pushing the university and other stakeholder to implement key changes to watching these initiatives roll out, keeping pressure, and acting. This is good and bad, right now it's a waiting game and looking at how initiatives and reports come out and seeing what we can do about it.

Student Precinct

Last week at student leaders we signed off on the majority of Doug Mac, the building that UMSU will be moving into. There are a few things left to sign off on, but as of right now were heading towards the end of the detailed design phase.

At steering committee this week I was given the very funky opportunity to look at the materials that the precinct will be built with. Mesh, brick, carpet, velvet, stone, woods, lino, paint swatches, pin board – everything! But curtains – no curtains 😞. The best material that I touched would have to be the glass brick! Its clear! Anyway, this will all be on display where tsubu used to be and I implore you all to go and look at what our precinct will look AND FEEL like. I really really enjoyed this.

The team have also requested to do another presentation to the office bearers and councillors in the next few weeks talking about what the updates have been in the past 6 months and walking through changes.

Fed Election

Change of Management Plan Review

The department has finally had a chance to reflect on the impact from the change of management plan implemented last year. We were promised there would be no increase in workload for the department. There have been multiple times we have had to organise piles of invoices, something the department hasn’t had to deal with in the past. These invoices include BBQ foods, AV payments for our Tuesday BBQs and riders for the artists. This change of management plan was passed in council last year and has seen the both of us in the office at a minimum of 4 days of the week. It’s taking away our ability to implement what we set out to do at the start of the year to do. The Activities department at the end of last year pushed for the appointment of a staff member dedicated towards our department. While the events team has helped us tremendously, it is not fair for our department to ask that they solely work for us, which would take away the resources that other departments have access to.

Theatre Board

We attended our second Theatre Board meeting of the year on Friday April 12. This meeting included approving grants for student theatre groups, and a discussion an upcoming strategic planning session to increase the accessibility of theatre board to students.

Next Wave/Student Precinct Meeting

We attended a Next Wave/Student Precinct meeting on Tuesday April 9. In the meeting we discussed how to increase visibility of Mudfest on campus to increase student engagement. We began talks with the Next Wave festival team around collaboration between the two festivals to create further student opportunity and pool our resources, particularly when it comes to using unconventional and outdoor spaces.

Mudfest

We have just finished selecting our core Mudfest Festival Team. This group includes a Production Manager, two Deputy Production Managers, Access Manager, Sustainability Manager, Marketing Manager and Publicity Manager, Website and Ticketing Manager, Visual Arts Creative Producer, Performing Arts Creative Producer, Music Creative Producer, Interdisciplinary Creative Producer and Moving Image Creative Producer. All successful and unsuccessful applicants for all these roles have been notified.

On Monday April 15 we had a whole Festival Team meeting where we gave out general info. We discussed modes of communication, responsibilities, aims and goals of the festival and mentors. We also set up more individual meetings to further discuss mentors and expectations of the roles.

We are continuing to meet with our Mudfest Mentor and discuss broader festival logistics. We have created measurable festival goals and ways we can determine whether they have been achieved throughout the process. We are beginning to dissect the festival timeline and make it more succinct.

Artist applications are ready currently open. They will close on Monday the 13th of May at 9am, and we will then begin selecting works in collaboration with the Creative Producers.

We are holding an artist information session at 11am on Friday May 3, which will allow prospective applicants to ask questions and receive support and information regarding their applications and work.

Key Activities

Take Back Our Coop BBQ

With a democratic push from the Take Back Our Coop group, we’re holding a BBQ on Wednesday the 17th of April. There’ll be sausages, flyers and general good spirited chats about how cooked the Coop is and how we need to get it back in the hands of the students. The point of this is to get the word out that people are caring about this issue, with a push for people to join the weekly meetings and be involved in a larger action at the end of semester.

Free Education Survey

The Free Education Survey is finally up and running! It’s on our website and will be pushed through all avenues that UMSU Ed has access to. The point of this survey is to lay the foundations for a massive free ed campaign to run through and beyond the election to obviously win free education on a government level.

Change the Rules rally

UMSU Ed facilitated and participated in the 150,000 unionist strong rally held in the city on the 10th of April. We had NUS flags to show union support for all students. Around 30 unimelb students stood with UMSU Ed and different university students in Melbourne’s CBD.

NTEU hook up

We met with NTEU 2 weeks ago to discuss plans moving forward and how the two unions (UMSU and NTEU) can help each other up. They asked us to flyer 2 mornings in the past two weeks for the Change the Rules rally and to facilitate a stall for them to flyer more outside Union House. We (Charli, Gurpreet Singh, Jess Miller and Conor Clements) all volunteered help with these actions.

Enrol to vote drive – election campaign

The election was called, and being an office dedicated to education and the bettering education for all, it’s a big deal for UMSU Ed. We’re holding a “enrol to drank” party on the night of council (Thursday 18th of April), where you get a free drink for successfully showing us your enrolment. It’s targeted at first years, with a stall every day this week to try and get students enrolled before the deadline to be able to vote in the 2019 federal election.

The Book Co-op zine workshop

UMSU Ed attended the Book Co-op’s weekly meeting this week. They discussed holding a workshop during Rad Ed week on how to and the importance of making zines. As we’re staunchly against the Big Corporate Coop, it’s important that we support groups trying to do the right thing by students, like the Book Co-op.

Key Activities

The On Track Pass initiative is continuing at a great pace. We have given out **seven 30 day passes** and **six 7 day passes** as of 12 April. There are several more 7 day pass appointments lined up. There is a date, yet to be confirmed, for appointments at VCA after Easter.

Key Activity 2

Running weekly On Track meetings, with about 10 people at each. We have done lecture bashes to boost the FTZ rally. The next mission is to build a strong contingent for a rally for postgraduate and international student concessions. Some of the existing campaigns for concessions don't include undergraduate international students, so we want to make sure that our campaign does include those students.

Key Activity 3

Met with Melbourne Law School faculty to discuss lecture recordings. MLS has no intention of changing their policy, despite the 500 signatures we've collected to show student support for change.

Key Activity 4

Met with Devendra Singh from Monash Postgraduate Association, as well as the International Officer at the Council of Australian Postgraduate Associations (CAPA) about organising a rally for postgraduate and international students on the steps of Victorian Parliament with Nikolai, a postgraduate student from Monash. Devendra is taking a proposal to the executive, so we should hear back soon about endorsement for a rally. It would [be based on this NSW rally from last year](#).

Surge Camp Report

Rationale behind Surge Camp

The bubble of student activists in UMSU and broader is extremely small compared to the number of students on our campus. Furthermore, students ability to get involved in campaigns, learn skills to be effective campaigners and meet, greet and mingle with UMSU officials is very low in UMSU.

The reason for this is at no fault of trying within UMSU, we hold BBQ's, we give them free food and we attempt to have workshops, but the long-term relationships are hard to build in this way. Therefore, at the beginning of the year, the Education Public Affairs office thought the best way to make long-term relationships, build skills with people outside the UMSU bubble and get an idea of what change looks like from the perspective of students, was to take them away for an entire weekend.

The rationale behind timing was as to not clash with other well-attended camps.

Promotion

As with everything through UMSU, Surge was promoted through comms. So LEDs, posters, etc etc.

2 emails were sent out to around 2000 subscribers each.

We also paid for \$150 in facebook advertising, which was extremely effective.

Successes

The students that are tangent to UMSU rock! The camp definitely proved that there are people untapped and inactivated in third and second year, which want to see more connection to UMSU. Also proved that people want to be more involved in the governance and “inner circle” of UMSU, but have literally no clue how to do this.

Students made multiple friends on the camp and have caught up since then multiple times.

Their connection to UMSU has strengthened and UMSU now has a source of volunteers who were previously non-aware of structures or opportunities amongst UMSU.

Facilities were perfect for what the camp needed, with rooms, food beds etc. There was tonnes of extra free activities to do and heaps of walking tracks with fun (albeit for children lol) rope courses and obstacle courses etc.

Failures

The turn-out wasn’t what was expected, the timing probably had a huge amount to do with that, with uni ramping up and people not being used to multiple events on at once.

The site was far away from public transport and didn’t have a good/cheap way to get to and from the camp site. There was one uber in the town, so emergency supplies etc were hard to access.

Recommendations Top 5

- 1. Do it again and do it often**

All in all this was a good camp that connected people who have never been connected with UMSU before. If our objective is to not be a tiny insular group of politics nerds then we need to support actions like this and we need to support them often.

2. Plan it during o-week

The people we want are busy. Ticket sales should go on sale in January and we should be SELLING tickets at o-week for it to be that weekend. I would recommend going up against big camps like Arts Camp etc because the students who want to be activated as activists won't be on those camps surprisingly.

3. Have a rally (next steps) event already planned during the semester

It's been hard to catch up with everyone from Surge Camp in the one place and differentiate between the really keen people and the semi-keeners. If there was some planned event happening maybe a month after the camp that everyone could put in their diaries and make a big deal out of I reckon that would keep the ties stronger

4. Hire a bus

If you choose Kyneton PGL again (which I would recommend) then I reckon a bus is wayyyyy better than the V-Line experience since you can all sit together etc.

5. Get it catered

The best thing to worry about during this camp is how everyone is doing and what the next event is, you don't want to be worrying about food and whether people are hungry etc. Spend the money, get it catered.

Key Activities
