



At Union House Theatre (UHT) we work to build communities of people who, through a shared passion for exploring creativity, come together to find a community and make art happen.



Artistic Director's Report

Artists constantly respond and adapt. It's what we do to keep art relevant, ideas fresh and push boundaries.

This desire to navigate new terrain is even the reason some of us are artists in the first place - to reflect, comment, make sense of the world or be part of a change. Great periods of art have come out of the most difficult and challenging times in history - and whilst we're still to truly understand the impact of COVID on theatre and young artists, we can be certain that we've been changed this year at least. Here at Union House Theatre, we've transferred our entire program online and developed new modes of connecting, communicating and being creative together.

Virtual intensives and workshops, digital art making projects, solo practice, technical videos and artist development initiatives have been the staple of activities with students in 2020. Moving online was challenging for people who love being in theatres and rehearsal rooms together. But silver linings now mean that this temporary transition has allowed for access to theatre in new ways. Maybe people who couldn't be part of our programs before felt a new ease and freedom to participate; and we've been able to keep connected with our students who needed to move out of Melbourne - wherever their homes may be.

We're longing to be in rehearsal rooms again – connecting with people face to face and getting to know a whole new generation of artists and audience. We're grateful for what we've learned during this year - demonstrating that a pandemic can't keep our community from being creative.

In my role as Artistic Director at Union House Theatre where I work with young and emerging artists, I cannot ignore how the pandemic will affect them. But also, I believe that the young people in our community hold answers. I'm continually inspired by the strength and willingness of the members of the UHT community. This year is no different - thanks to everyone who was part of UHT in 2020 - whether you participated in one of our programs for the first time or are a seasoned regular - we look forward to a bright future together.







Presented by Union House Theatre and the Dirty Laundry Collective

What started as a research-led exploration by Union House Theatre (to investigate creative practice during a time of lockdown) became a multi-dimensional community of makers, thinkers and performers creating something significant together. Through investment in practice and one another, the *between here and when i tell you* project involved workshops, mentoring, conversations, peer-learning opportunities and of course, the digital art outcomes which you see on this web-stage: dirtylaundrycollective.com.au

I have always been invested in the notion of 'the collective' as a way to share skills and support art making practices beyond mainstream or traditional bricks and mortar models. In April, with these bricks and mortar buildings closed, I brought together a group of emerging artists with collaborator Zoe Scoglio. In a digital space we asked: how can young artists develop individual practice at this time, and build a collective of makers which offers a framework of support and skills sharing?

The **between here and when i tell you project** has been an opportunity to ask critical young voices what art-making structures they need. What continues to surface is the desire for time, for reflection, for championing alternative structures to make work and support one another as creatives and community.

Production Report

2020 - No opened venues, no testing 1-2-3, no lighting chases and clean dressing rooms?! - the year of social distancing, lockdowns and no IRL student performances...time for a Production evolution!

The UHT Production team has had one heck of a year. We have had to think outside the (bio) box but luckily we are a creative bunch. We have transported the production team into the COVIDsafe world and embraced (with some kicking and screaming!) online and digital performance making. We had to start thinking towards some old school theatre trickery and fattened the curve of expediential upskilling by holding production meetings and technical sessions via Zoom, becoming video directors, editors and content creators, scouting 5km radius locations, designing theories for lighting and Foley sound effects for online performances, creating caption wizardry, hosting live online Q&A sessions and building webstages all for our wonderful student theatre community.

The UHT Production team has spent 3,520 hours on Zoom, created 22 'How To' technical videos hosted nine 'You Can Ask That?!' technical Q&A sessions, mentored 12 emerging technical, design and management students, captioned 26 videos, saved 72 (3.6 km) rolls of gaffa tape and facilitated one salubrious Zoom dinner party launch event!

While we look forward to seeing our venues overflowing with the excitement, creativity and nervous anticipation of students again, we will remember 2020 for quite some time.

Writer in Residence Program

UHT has a long history of supporting young and emerging playwrights.

With an impressive alumni list of writers, we take our role seriously. We know that the opportunity to write and develop new voices in writing is critical – and we try to provide a program where it's safe to fail, to soar and where you can test and try things out with a like-minded group of people and a supportive artist to mentor you along the way.

This year we partnered with our wonderful neighbours – La Mama Theatre. La Mama provides critical pathways for our UHT students, and we were thrilled to solidify this relationship further in 2020. Together, we doubled up on the number of writers involved, created another network for emerging playwrights and seeded future development opportunities. The program was virtually presented and included workshops, readings and one-on-one development sessions with guest playwrights.


The four professional playwright-mentors were Mari Lourey, Declan Ferber Gillick, Samah Sabawi and Olivia Satchell.

The company hosted online workshops, one-on-one virtual mentorships and collaboration around prioritising access and inclusion in theatre.
