What is the Education Department?

The Education department is a main advocate for student rights at your student union, UMSU. We comprise two separate sub-departments — Education (Academic Affairs) aka **EdAc** and Education (Public Affairs) aka **EdPub**. The issues we deal with can be in the classroom itself, such as ensuring all lectures are recorded to overarching policy matters like equal access to classes, fair PhD stipends or workers' rights.

EdAc focuses on ensuring that the academic policies are fair and equitable for all, such as ensuring fair academic integrity processes, eligibility for special consideration and providing safe and accessible learning conditions.

EdPub is an activist department focused on creating impactful campaigns based on a wide range of issues that impact students' education. We collect data and consolidate student experience which allows us to represent student interests effectively and advocate for them on the right platforms.

EdPub and **EdAc** work closely together with the UMSU President and UMSU's Advocacy & Legal Services to create effective change. In addition, a group of 7 students are elected annually as voting members on the Education Committee, who determine the direction and finances of the department.

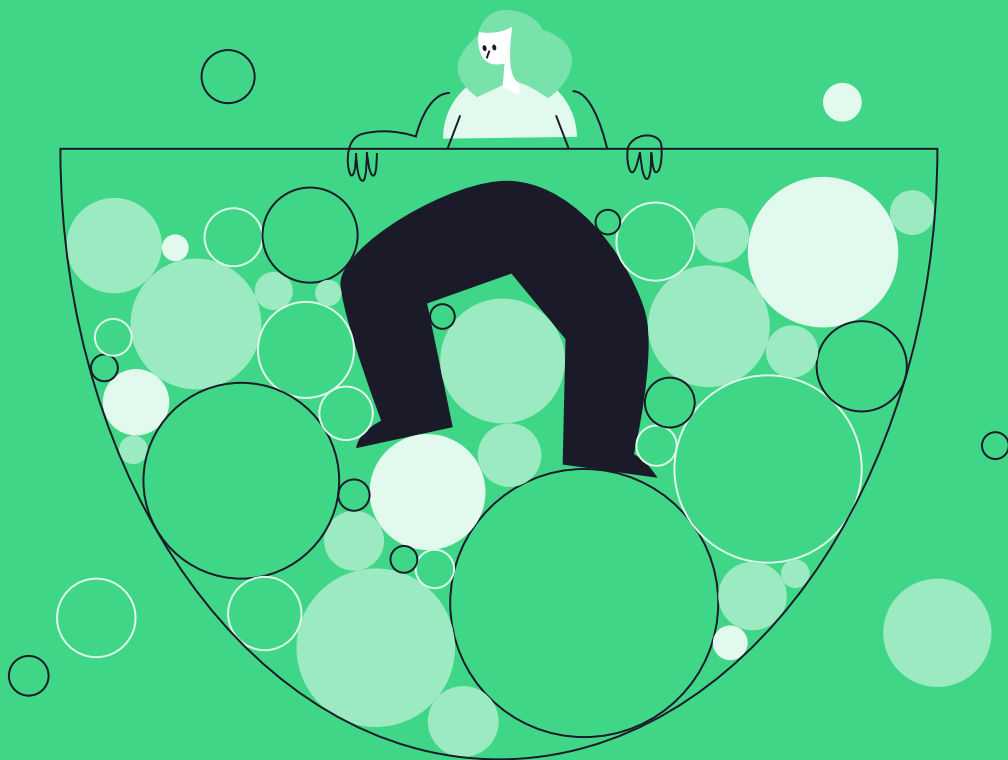

Student Representative Network

Have you ever wondered who makes the decisions that dictate what you study in your course, who teaches you, how many students there are in your class or how long the exam period is? Have you ever had issues with any of these things and wondered if there was a way to change them? Then the Student Representative Network (SRN) is the place for you.

The SRN is a group of students that care about their education and want a say in the decision-making process. SRN members sit as voting representatives on a number of University committees, and have a say in all decisions made.

Students are supported by Student Governance Training provided by the UMSU Advocacy Service to understand and contribute to committees. The SRN holds regular meetings throughout the semester, during which student representatives report back on the issues discussed in their committee meetings and seek advice and input from other student representatives, to work towards positive change for all students.

The SRN provides a great opportunity for students to get more involved in their university experience, have a say and enact change.

UMSU ASSEMBLIES

As one of our biggest events, the Assemblies will provide a lot of opportunities for engagement either as a participant or an education volunteer. The assembly includes a collaborative *"Know Your Rights"* workshop that expands on protecting and enacting student rights on and off campus, and a panel discussion with speakers from diverse university backgrounds to tackle key issues. We aim to tackle issues such as student housing, PhD stipends, and equal employment opportunities. It will be a free and catered event in Market Hall and will only be held once a semester. Campaigns

MAKE CAREER FAIRS FAIR

Currently, university career fairs are next to useless for international students. If you, like many of us, have been going to them for the past couple of years you would know the frustration of walking up to a booth, getting excited as you learn about their program and their work, only to find out that they don't even consider international applicants. By the end of the fair, you might have accumulated several tote bags full of pamphlets and maybe a Krispy Kreme donut but are no better off with career opportunities. University of Melbourne promises to be a global campus and has a duty to provide all its students with equal employment opportunities that are based on merit and not nationality. Our campaign will focus on ensuring that only employers that hire both domestic and international students be part of university-related employment fairs and events.

TRANSPARENCY AND ACCESSIBILITY CAMPAIGN

We will advocate for increasing transparency and accessibility within the University. This will include making the end-of-subject survey results public, expanding the '3-day, no-documentation extension policy' from FEIT to other faculties, ensuring the closed captioning on lectures isn't AI generated, and expanding Academic Adjustment Plans (AAPs) to all students who need it.

A big part of this campaign will be reversing the recent decision made by the academic board regarding special consideration exams. Starting Semester 1, 2025, if a student is granted a special exam, they won't be able to see their final exam grades. This means a student will be forced to decide to take the special exam without knowing if they passed or failed the original. We plan to petition the academic board to overturn this decision by Semester 2.

QUEER INCLUSION SURVEY

We're doing a Queerphobia report in collaboration with the UMSU Queer department. We hope that the results of the survey will force the university to recognise the existing queerphobia at this university, take action to reduce queerphobia, and provide a safe campus for its queer students.

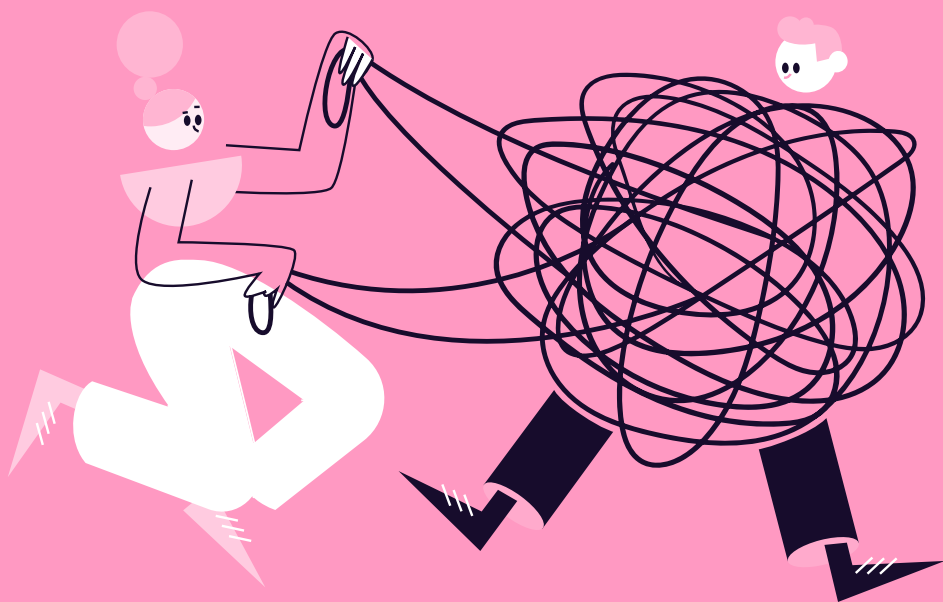

The UMSU Advocacy Service offers information, support, and referrals across a range of academic and administrative issues.

We can help with most issues relating to your enrolment, with a few exceptions (like giving course advice or counselling support, or other specialist areas).

We can assist with things like:

- ☹ 'Show Cause' or academic progress issues
- ☹ Misconduct allegations
- ☹ Making complaints
- ☹ Special consideration disputes
- ☹ Supervision issues
- ☹ Guidance on escalating complaints to the NSO (National Student Ombudsman)

And more!

EXAMPLES OF WHO AND WHEN TO REACH OUT TO

1. Student Y is receiving cash payments that are less than minimum wage for the job they've been contracted for. Student Y should reach out to the UMSU Legal Service. (Page 14)
2. Student X's rental providers are unfairly refusing to return the bond after the lease has ended. Student X should reach out to the UMSU Legal Service. (Page 14)
3. Student Z receives an email telling them they are being accused of using generative AI software for their graduate thesis. Student Z should reach out to the UMSU Advocacy Service. (Page 13)

The UMSU Legal Service is a specialist community legal centre that provides free and confidential legal assistance and financial counselling services to all currently enrolled students of the University of Melbourne. The UMSU Legal Service provides assistance on various legal issues, including:

UMSU Advocacy and Legal services has extensive self-help information online, which explains sexual harassment and assault.

Workshops for students at the University about Bystander Intervention and how to respond when someone shares experiences of sexual assault or harassment are held by the UMSU Sexual Harm Response Coordinators. Any student can register and participate.

SECURITY

Security Escort

If you ever feel unsafe on campus, trained security officers are available to escort you to locations on or near the campus.

This free service is available to all students and staff from anywhere on campus and can be availed by calling **(03) 8344 6666** or **1800 246 066** (this number is available on the back of your student ID).

The **Blue Help Phones** on campus also have an emergency button that immediately alerts campus security and help will be dispatched.

The UMSU Advocacy and Legal Services and the Sexual Harm Response Coordinators are situated on the Level 2, Building 168 opposite the Education offices.

In case you want a person to talk to, or are unsure about how to proceed, please come by either office or email us and we'll be happy to help as best we can.

SAFEZONE MOBILE APP

As part of the University's commitment to personal safety, staff and students can download a free mobile phone application called **SafeZone** from Apple's App Store or the Google Play Store.

In the event of an emergency, the app allows you to quickly share your location and details with the University security team who will be able to get the right assistance for you.

Know Your Rights @ Work

Here is a brief overview of your working rights. Visit Fair Work for detailed information on your work rights.

REMEMBER

- ☹ Most employees in Australia are protected by the National Employment Standards (NES).
- ☹ Your employer must ensure you receive at least the minimum wage
- ☹ Your employer must provide a pay slip when you are paid. (Including cash payments)
- ☹ Your employer must pay superannuation into your nominated fund. This money grows over your lifetime and provides for your retirement.
- ☹ Your employer can't ask you to work on a 'trial basis' for no pay.
- ☹ You must only work up to the limits set by your student visa work rights. As an international student in Australia, once your course begins, you can work up to 48 hours per fortnight during term time and unlimited hours during semester breaks and holidays.
- ☹ Casual pay should be calculated based on an hourly rate, not a 'session' or 'shift' rate.
- ☹ Everyone has the right not to be bullied, sexually harassed or discriminated against at work

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' RIGHTS:

- ☹ International students have the same employment rights in Australia as all other employees
- ☹ You must only work up to the limits set by your student visa conditions. For most international students in Australia, once your course begins, you can work up to 48 hours per fortnight when your course is 'in session', that is, the advertised semesters including exam periods and mid-semester breaks. You can work unlimited hours when your course is not in session
- ☹ Where to get help? Having an issue related to work? All employees in the national workplace relations system receive basic minimum entitlements known as the National Employment Standards (NES)

JOIN YOUR UNION!

Unions exist in every industry in Australia to defend and protect YOUR working rights!

Your union may help you with all sorts of issues including wage theft (where your employer doesn't pay you correctly), unsafe working conditions, workplace bullying, unfair dismissal and more.

If you're having issues at work or feel like you're being treated unfairly reach out to the relevant union.

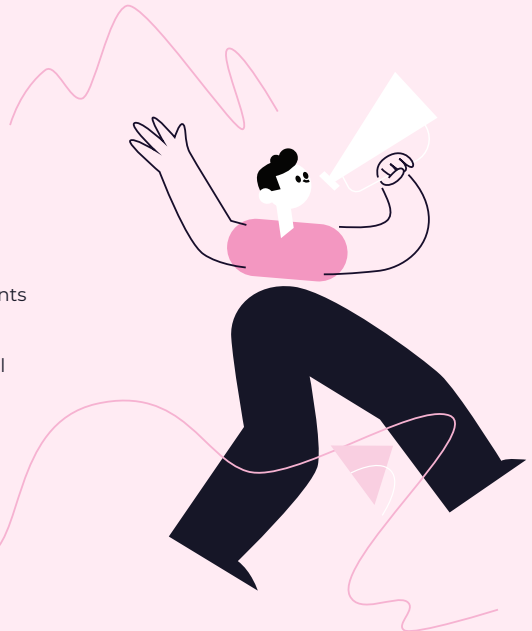

National Tertiary Education Union (NTEU)	University tutors and staff, academics, students
Health Services Union (HSU)	Public and private hospitals, aged care, disability services, community health, private practices, Aboriginal health services, ambulance services and pathology services
United Workers Union (UWU)	Hospitality, market research and call centers, aged care and disability support, health workers, paramedics, logistics and supermarket supply chain, early education and childcare, teachers aides, cleaners, security officers, agriculture, food and beverage manufacturing, casino workers
Australian Services Union (ASU)	Local government, social and community services, water and statutory authorities
Australian Education Union (AEU)	Public education union representing teachers and support staff in government schools, early education, TAFE, disability and adult education
Community and Public Service Union (CPSU)	Government employees, associated Government agencies, and community sector organisations

Know Your Rights @ University

Remember you have the right to:

- ☺ Have all your lectures recorded
- ☺ Apply for Special Consideration or an Academic Adjustment plan
- ☺ Dispute a result you think is unfair
- ☺ Feel safe on campus (and anywhere else!)
- ☺ Make a complaint or grievance against the University, a staff member or another student
- ☺ Appeal decisions that affect you to the Academic Board or the National Student Ombudsman
- ☺ Make an appeal if you believe you were incorrectly denied an offer to a course
- ☺ A safe learning environment, free from discrimination and harassment
- ☺ Access academic assistance
- ☺ Access counselling and psychological services on campus
- ☺ Not have any assessments due during the SWOTVAC period
- ☺ Confidentiality in any personal matters you bring to the University or UMSU
- ☺ Feedback on your completed assessments if requested
- ☺ Access the affordable University medical service
- ☺ Affordable and accessible education




National Student Ombudsman

The National Student Ombudsman (NSO) is a new complaints function within the Office of the Commonwealth Ombudsman. The NSO is independent, impartial and provides an effective, trauma-informed complaints mechanism for higher education students. The NSO is there for students to escalate complaints about the actions of their higher education provider.

Before you consider lodging a complaint with the National Student Ombudsman, we strongly recommend that students first reach out to the **UMSU Advocacy Service** for advice via:

Complaints can be made anonymously, as a group, or on behalf of someone with their consent.

EXAMPLES OF WHO AND WHEN TO REACH OUT TO

1. Student X lodged an application for special consideration along with ample supporting documentation, but the University refused the request without proper explanation. Student X can take the issue up for consideration to the National Student Ombudsman. (But remember to contact UMSU Advocacy for advice first!)
2. Graduate student Y, facing mobility challenges, requested modifications to their workspace to facilitate access and participation in lab activities. The University dismissed the request citing logistical challenges. Student X can approach the National Student Ombudsman to ensure the university adheres to accessibility standards and provides necessary modifications.

Know Your Rights with Housing

Remember you have the right to:

WHEN APPLYING FOR A RENTAL PROPERTY:

- ☹ To receive accurate information from the rental provider or agent, including about any past breaches of rental laws.
- ☹ To be protected from discrimination on the basis of protected attributes — including your race, gender and sexuality
- ☹ To be entitled to a refund if you pay a holding deposit then don't sign a rental agreement
- ☹ At the start of tenancy:
- ☹ To a clean and vacant property at the commencement of the tenancy.
- ☹ To have the bond lodged with the Residential Tenancies Bond Authority (RTBA), within 10 business days, ensuring it is handled fairly and returned promptly unless claims are made for damages or unpaid rent.
- ☹ To receive 2 copies of a condition report — you make your own notes on the report about anything you disagree with, keep a copy, and return this to your agent/landlord within 5 business days

DURING THE TENANCY:

- ☹ To proper notice if the landlord wishes to terminate the tenancy and right to dispute unjust eviction through the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT).
- ☹ Rights concerning privacy and conditions under which landlords or agents can enter the property.
- ☹ Special considerations and protections under family violence circumstances, allowing victims to alter their living arrangements to ensure safety

AT THE END OF THE TENANCY :

- ☹ To transfer or sublet your tenancy to someone else with the consent of the rental provider
- ☹ To proper notice if the rental provider wishes to terminate the tenancy, and right to dispute unjust eviction through the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT)
- ☹ To have your bond returned to you from the RTBA unless claims are made by the rental provider for damages or unpaid rent

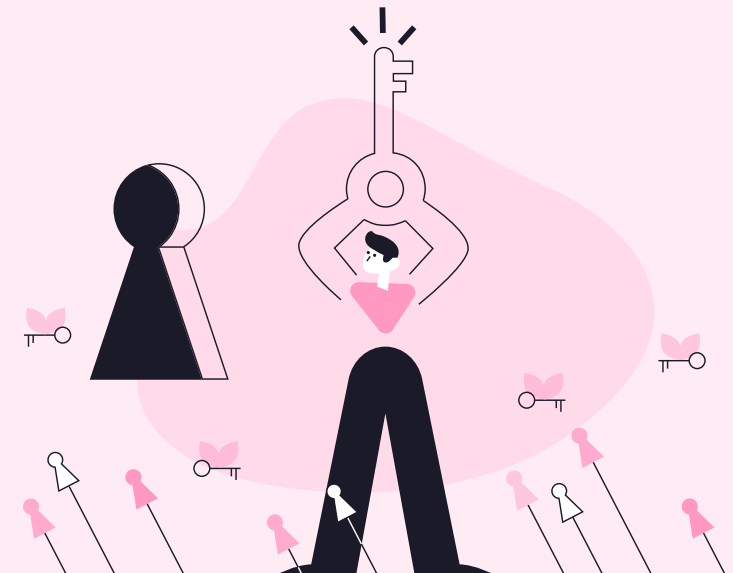

-  Group academic skills workshops and classes

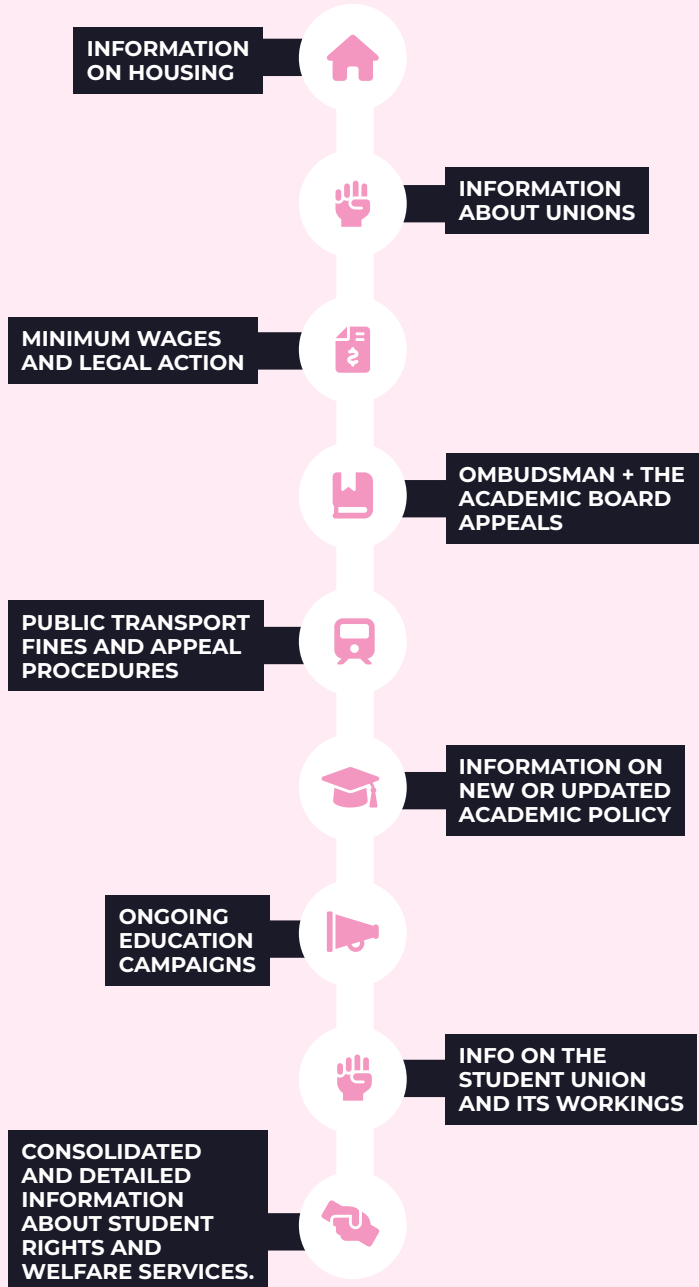
